- Support and information



RHD more common than CHD in countries with poor CHD survival










What is a Rights Declaration?




As set forth in the World Health Organization's founding constitution, the highest attainable standard of health is a fundamental right of every human being. We, the undersigned organizations, believe that every person affected by childhoodonset heart disease has the right to receive all needed services to reach their full potential. This universal right is shared by all affected people worldwide regardless of age, gender, ethnicity, race, nationality, religion, or socioeconomic status.

Declaration of the Rights for Individuals Affected by Childhood-onset Heart Disease"



Principle 1: Every person with childhood-onset heart disease should receive the *health care they need* that is *timely, affordable, accessible, safe, patient-centered, and life-long*



- Protection from childhood mortality
- High-quality care
- Health education
- Involvement in our own care



Needed Government Actions

- Government job: ensure accessible, affordable, safe, high-quality care
 - Set highest possible standards of care
 - Accountability
 - Measure collect data
 - Use data to create laws, policies, and programs to improve health
- Transparency Patients and families get data to inform decisions.
- Equity marginalized populations get highest-quality care.



Principle 2: Every person with childhood-onset heart disease should live *free of discrimination* and have full access to the *education, employment,* and *social benefits and services* necessary to ensure their life-long well-being and full participation in society.



- Protection from stigma
- Training and accommodation
- Disability/family leave benefits
- Social support and mental health services



Needed Government Actions

- Laws to protect educational, economic, and social rights
- Include CHD and RHD in disability programs and policies
- Measure impact of CHD/RHD on economic, social, mental well-being
- Educate public on CHD/RHD and combat stigma
- Promote patient and family organizations

- Promote rights-based CHD/RHD advocacy
